Demographics

Summary

Ridgeview Elementary, opened in 2011, is the only school in Keller ISD where the student population enters into two separate feeder patterns in the 5th grade. We are a pre-k through 4th-grade campus with a total enrollment of 506 students.

Student Learning

Summary

Ridgeview Elementary is committed to continuously reflecting on instructional practices to ensure we are meeting the needs of all students. Student achievement is monitored regularly through a variety of measures. NWEA MAP assessments are administered three times a year to track academic growth, while teachers also use classroom observations, unit assessments, and STAAR testing to evaluate progress. Student learning is reviewed throughout each instructional unit, and data from all assessments are used to guide decisions for targeted remediation and enrichment opportunities, ensuring every student is supported and challenged to reach their full potential.

STAAR Data:

On the Math STAAR Test, 60% of third graders and 45% of our fourth grade students met expectations. Our Hybrid Math students in 4th grade took the 5th grade math STAAR and 97% met expectations. On the Reading STAAR Test, 58% of third graders and 62% of fourth grade students met expectations.

School Processes & Programs

Summary

Ridgeview Elementary implements district curriculum with fidelity through collaborative grade-level and content planning. Math and Reading coaches provide ongoing support and modeling to strengthen instruction. NWEA MAP, pre- and post-assessments, and classroom data guide targeted interventions and enrichment within the MTSS framework. Teachers meet monthly in PLCs to review progress and refine instructional practices, while SIT meetings ensure support for students with additional needs.

Ridgeview fosters belonging through its House System, student leadership opportunities, and clubs such as Sewing, Pokemon, Rockin Rattlers Choir, Gardening and Kindness Club. The PTA and campus events promote strong family and community engagement. Safety remains a top priority, supported by a dedicated Security Officer, regular drills, and the Raptor system for visitor management.

Campus priorities include closing achievement gaps in mathematics and strengthening writing in Reading Language Arts through data-driven instruction and continuous PLC collaboration.

This will include at least a 5% increase in the percentage of these students meeting grade-level standards, as well as growth in their average raw scores compared to the 2024-2025 school year. Targeted interventions and support will be provided to close instructional gaps and strengthen core content knowledge.

Each teacher will receive a minimum of two documented feedback touchpoints per semester, with follow-up coaching conversations as needed. Walkthrough and feedback logs will be reviewed quarterly to ensure consistency, support instructional growth, and strengthen a culture of continuous improvement.

Measure of Success:

100% of teachers will receive at least two documented feedback touchpoints per semester, and walkthrough/feedback logs will show evidence of timely follow-up and growth in instructional practices.

Action Step 1

Create and share a monthly walkthrough tracker in September 2025 to ensure administrators consistently visit all classrooms across grade levels and content areas.
